



Please further note that the rejection of the claim was based on the fact that our District has never [or] has not over the past 20 years had an employee who retired from the District based on disability and received ordinary disability retirement benefits from CalPERS. Thus, there is no member of the purported plaintiff class, as described in the Exhibit A – Claim Narrative, who has retired from this District.

My firm represents Cari McCormick. Enclosed you will find an administrative charge, with exhibits, filed by Ms McCormick with the California Civil Rights Department, naming as respondents the California Public Employees' Retirement System, Lake County, and the State of California.

As the charge explains, Ms McCormick's claims concern how certain pension benefits are calculated and paid through CalPERS. Those claims are brought *on behalf of* a putative class of California public employees ("Plaintiff Class"). Those claims are brought *against* a putative class of California public entity employers who employed one or more members of the proposed plaintiff class ("Defendant Class"). Ms McCormick will propose that the State of California, as represented by the California Attorney General's Office, serve as class representative for the proposed Defendant Class.

We have reason to believe your public entity may have employed one or more members of the proposed Plaintiff Class, because your public entity contracts to pay pension benefits through CalPERS. For that reason, we are serving Ms McCormick's FEHA charge on your public entity pursuant to Government Code section 12962(b). In addition, to the extent the government claim presentation requirements may apply, we hereby present the enclosed charge as a government claim.



#### Exhibit A - Claim Narrative

Plaintiff Cari McCormick is an individual.

Defendants California Public Employees' Retirement System ("CalPERS"), State of California, and County of Lake are California governmental entities.

Plaintiff is ignorant of the true names or capacities of defendants named herein as Does 1 through 3,000, inclusive, and therefore identifies these defendants by these fictitious names. Each of the defendants named herein or designated as a Doe, is liable or in some manner legally responsible for the events alleged herein.

Plaintiff seeks to have the State of California, represented by the California Attorney General's Office, appointed to represent a defendant class, which includes all public entities that both employed one or more Plaintiffs, and are liable for employer-side retirement contributions for one or more Plaintiffs. A list of public entities believed to potentially be included within that defendant class, based on their listing as employers within the 2021-2022 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report published by CalPERS, is attached as Exhibit C.

Plaintiff refers to all defendants here collectively as "Defendants."

Plaintiff seeks to represent a plaintiff class of similarly situated persons. The class includes all persons who were employed by Defendants; who were at or over age 40 at the time they became members of the CalPERS system; who applied for and were granted ordinary disability retirement; whose retirement benefits are administered by CalPERS; and either (1) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments pursuant to Government Code section 21423, who were over age 41 at membership in CalPERS, and who at retirement were credited with 18.518 or fewer years of actual service; or (2) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments pursuant to Government Code section 21098, and who at retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments pursuant to Government Code section 21424, and who at retirement were credited with 29.629 or fewer years of actual service.

Plaintiff was employed by County of Lake; was over age 40 at membership in CalPERS; applied for and was granted ordinary disability retirement; receives benefits administered by CalPERS; and presently receives monthly disability benefit payments pursuant to one of the sections listed above. See, generally, McCormick v. Public Employees' Retirement System (2019) 41 Cal.App.5th 428.

Plaintiff refers to herself and the proposed plaintiff class collectively as "Plaintiffs."

At all relevant times, each of the Defendants was the agent of each of the remaining Defendants and, in doing the things alleged herein, was acting with the course and scope of such agency.

Each of the Defendants' actions or omissions as alleged herein was ratified by each of the remaining Defendants. Each of the acts or omissions of a Defendant's agents as alleged herein was ratified by that Defendant, as well as by each of the remaining Defendants. Each of the Defendants had knowledge of unlawful discrimination practiced upon its employees by the other Defendants, and failed to thereafter take all reasonable steps to prevent further discrimination against its employees. Each of the Defendants provided substantial assistance or encouragement to the other Defendants in the discrimination alleged here, and thereby caused harm to Plaintiff and the proposed class. Each of the Defendants had knowledge of the discrimination alleged here, and cooperated in that discrimination. For purposes of the discrimination alleged here, each of the Defendants was a joint employer and engaged in a joint venture, including by engaging in a combination of resources to carry out a single undertaking, with each having separate ownership interests in the joint undertaking, joint control, and an agreement to share profits and losses of that joint undertaking.

California law governs Plaintiffs' retirement benefits, and provides for ordinary disability retirement benefits for certain public employees such as Plaintiff who are rendered unable to do their job by any non-industrial long-term disability.

California law calculates such ordinary disability retirement benefits in a way that discriminates based on advanced age at membership. Government Code sections 21098, 21424, and 21423 each provides for younger employees to receive an ordinary disability retirement benefit equal to at least 33.333% of their final compensation. By contrast, older employees receive significantly reduced benefits, because those benefits are based on imputed years of service through age 60. For example, assume two state miscellaneous first-tier employees are otherwise identical, except that one was hired at age 18, the other at age 49. Each puts in 10 years of actual credited service, and each is forced to retire due to disabilities. The 18-year-old-at-hire will receive a benefit equal to 33.333% of his final compensation, because the formula gives him service credit as if he had worked without interruption through age 60. By contrast, the 49-year-old-at-hire will receive a benefit equal to just 19.8% under section 21423, with the difference in benefit amounts solely due to the older employee's advanced age.

Defendants are liable for disparate treatment. Defendants are qualifying employers, and employed Plaintiffs. Plaintiffs were over age 40 at membership. Defendants paid Plaintiffs reduced retirement benefits compared to employees younger at membership. Plaintiffs' age over 40 at membership was a substantial motivating factor in Defendants' determination and payment of the amount of Plaintiffs' disability retirement benefits. Plaintiffs have been harmed. Defendants' payment of reduced benefits to Plaintiffs is a substantial factor in causing them harm.

Defendants are also liable for pattern-or-practice of intentional discrimination. Discrimination is Defendants' standard operating procedure, rather than an unusual practice, and that standard operating procedure is a substantial factor in harming Plaintiffs.

Defendants are also liable for disparate impact. Defendants are qualifying employers, and employed Plaintiffs. Plaintiffs were over age 40 at membership. Defendants maintained a common policy or practice that has a disproportionate adverse effect on persons over age 40 at membership. Plaintiffs have been harmed. Defendants' policy or practice was a substantial factor in causing Plaintiffs' harm.

Defendants are also liable for their failure to prevent discrimination against Plaintiffs. Defendants knew or should have known of the above-alleged discrimination, and failed to take all reasonable steps necessary to prevent the same from occurring, thereby causing harm to Plaintiffs.

Defendants are also liable for breach of contract. At hiring, Defendants promised Plaintiffs future pay in exchange for present work, and Defendants' monthly retirement benefit payments are wages paid after the fact for Plaintiffs' years of labor. See, e.g., Kern v. Long Beach (1947) 29 Cal.2d 848, 850-852. The retirement benefit provisions at issue are contractual terms of class members' employment agreements: by those retirement provisions, Defendants promised class members future pay in exchange for present work, and once class members began performance, class members obtained a vested contractual right to the benefits Defendants had promised. See, e.g., McGlynn v. State of California (2018) 21 Cal.App.5th 548, 559.

Defendants maintained express written contractual terms of employment that provided for class members to be paid reduced retirement benefits based on their advanced ages at hiring. See, Gov. Code §§ 21098, 21424, 21423. Those terms of employment violate or are contrary to overriding state laws (i.e., Gov. Code § 12940, subd. (a)) regulating such terms of employment, by providing for reduced compensation based solely on an employees' advanced age at hiring. To that extent, those terms of employment are contrary to superseding state law, they are illegal contractual terms, they are contrary to public policy, and they are therefore void. See, Civil Code § 1667. The unlawful terms of Plaintiffs' contracts with Defendants are severable, such that the illegal contract terms should be severed, and the balance of the contracts enforced. Armendariz v. Found. Health Psychcare Servs., Inc. (2000) 24 Cal.4th 83, 124. With illegal contractual terms severed, class members' contracts with the Defendants provide for class members to receive equal retirement benefits.

Alternately, FEHA's prohibition on age discrimination constitutes a contractual term of employment implied by operation of law into Plaintiffs' employment agreements with Defendants, such that Defendants were subject to a contractual duty to pay nondiscriminatory retirement benefits. See, Castillo v. Express Escrow Company (2007) 146 Cal.App.4th 1301, 1308 ("all laws in existence when the agreement was made become part of the contract"); Anderson v. Time Warner Telecom of California (2005) 129 Cal.App.4th 411, 418 ("All applicable laws are presumed to be known by the parties and to form a part of the agreement as if those laws were expressly referred to and incorporated."); Coral Farms, L.P. v. Mahony (2021) 63 Cal.App.5th 719, 731 ("The incorporation of current law into a contract is presumed and does not require a deliberate expression by the parties.").

The terms of Plaintiffs' employment contracts were sufficiently clear that the parties could understand what each was required to do, the parties exchanged consideration, and the parties agreed to terms. Plaintiffs did all, or substantially all, of the significant things their contracts required of them. Defendants failed to pay non-discriminatory benefits under the contracts, or paid discriminatory benefits in violation of the contracts. Plaintiffs were harmed. Defendants' breaches of contract were a substantial factor in causing Plaintiffs' harm.

The harm to Plaintiffs includes the loss of retirement benefits, the loss of additional amounts of money each would have received had he or she not suffered such unlawful discrimination, and harm in the form of humiliation, mental anguish, and emotional distress.

Defendants are also liable for prospective relief for violations of California's Equal Protection clause. Such relief includes declaratory relief, injunctive relief, and issuance of writs of mandamus and/or prohibition.

Thus, Defendants' unlawful policies and practices as alleged adversely affect, in a similar manner, a class of persons of which Plaintiff is a member, and raise substantial questions of law and fact that are common to that class. For those reasons, Plaintiff files this charge on behalf of a class of all others similarly situated, and seeks to represent the same.

The following report summarizes LPVCWD, IPU Waterworks, BPOU, and PVOU operational and compliance activities of August and since the last report to the Board. The report also includes the status of various projects for each system.

#### DISTRIBUTION, SUPPLY AND PRODUCTION

- Monthly Water Production Summary Total production from the LPVCWD Wellfield for the month of August was 327.59 AF, of which 184.57 AF was delivered to Suburban Water Systems. IPU Waterworks Well No. 5 produced a total of 176.21 AF in the month of August. The August Monthly Production Report is provided as *Attachment 1*.
- Well Water Levels and Pumping Rates The latest static water level, pumping water level, and pumping rate for LPVCWD and CIWS are as shown in the table below.

#### CAPITAL / OTHER PROJECTS

LPVCWD Recycled Water Project

Staff have finalized the LACSD site use permit. Field Staff has received the necessary parts, and crews are scheduled next week to perform the required work to complete the retrofit process for the recycled water meter serving the Homestead Museum. Once this work has been completed, the recycled water pump station and pipeline will be fully activated, serving customers with reclaimed water. Staff is also working with the remaining customers to prepare permit applications and individual designs for retrofitting all water meters.

2. LPVCWD PVOU IZ Project and SZ-South Project.

Staff continue to conduct bi-weekly project meetings with RC Foster to discuss the plant startup. Also, the District's operators are running the IZ treatment plant, with discharge to the storm drain, now that the NPDES permit requirements have been met. RC Foster crews were working on the maintenance of the CIP piping, and LPVCWD Staff performed the flowmeter calibration for the LACSD permit.

RC Foster has continued onsite construction for the new PVOU-SZ Treatment Plant. Recent construction activities include RC Foster crews running EW-C and EW-N Extraction Wells per required routine flushing and Wigen tech working on setting up the SCADA system/program, logic, and testing plant operations.

- 3. Distribution Leak Repairs & Maintenance Field staff performed various replacements and leak repairs to the water distribution systems in August. They have repaired and replaced: 3 water service lines, 5 curb stop replacements, 24 meter replacements, and 16 meter box replacements.
- 4. LPVCWD Nitrate Treatment System Staff is currently working with the contractor to complete the necessary construction work, including the installation of a flushing line for the brine pump system and the installation of pneumatic air lines for the new valves to complete the Nitrate system, making it fully operational. Once all work has been completed, the project team will resume testing in preparation for the loading of resin and DDW compliance testing.

#### **DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS**

- 1. LPVCWD New 34-Unit Mix-Used Apartment Building at 15861 Main Street Staff was recently contacted by a new developer that the project will be moving forward, and the developer requested to begin the first phases of the District's new development process. Staff is currently working with the District's Engineer in performing the water system demand analysis. Once the analysis is complete, the developer will receive the "will-serve" letter outlining the report's findings and a water capacity analysis for the project.
- 2. LPVCWD New ADU Project at 16149 Abbey Street Staff recently received a request from the property owner at 16149 Abbey St. to install a new 1-inch water service and meter to provide service to a new ADU project. Staff is reviewing the submittal and preparing to provide the property owner with a cost estimate letter for the construction and water capacity fees related to the project.

The following report summarizes LPVCWD, IPU Waterworks System, BPOU and PVOU-IZ & SZ operations, which includes the status of various projects for each system.

#### WATER QUALITY / COMPLIANCE

- **Distribution System Monitoring** District Staff collected all required water quality samples from both LPVCWD & IPUWS distribution systems for the month; approximately 65 samples were collected. All results met State and Federal drinking water quality regulations.
- Treatment Monitoring & Compliance All water quality compliance samples were collected from all the treatment processes and plant effluent, as required. Approximately 163 samples were collected.
- **Source Monitoring** All water quality samples were collected from all the Wells, as required. Approximately **24** samples were collected. The table below summarizes LPVCWD Wells' current water quality for constituents of concern.

#### OPERATIONAL UPDATES & PROJECTS

- 1) **BPOU Treatment Plant** Nitrate Project is still under construction, going through some final checks and some programming updates. The treatment plant is normal operation flowing through the bypass. **Repairs & Maintenance** Staff have performed various weekly chemical calibrations, monthly analyzer cleanings and calibrations, SPIX pre-filter change-outs, daily treatment plant rounds and monthly reporting.
- 2) **PVOU-IZ** Treatment Plant Staff continue to run the plant daily and complete daily rounds and maintenance. Programming issues are still being worked out by the group, consisting of the SCADA, Wigen-RO, SPI, Geosyntec, Stantec, Northrop Grumman and the LPVCWD teams.
- 3) **PVOU-SZ** Treatment Plant Under Construction, most equipment has been delivered and has been installed and is in the process of being commissioned by each vendor. Electrical work is continuing by the electrical contractor Frank's. RO membranes have been delivered on site, along with filter media. Wigen RO staff has been onsite programming the system. Trojan UV team has been on site commission their systems. LPVCWD staff has continued O&M maintenance oversight.
- 4) **IPUWS** Well No. 5 Between Tesco and Hunter Electric The Well is running and supplying water to SGVWC's B-5 facility in Hand operation, at the request of SGVWC. All electrical repairs have been completed. In order to return the control of the well to Auto, control issues found in the Tesco panel need to be addressed. Currently, Tesco has completed the repairs to the PLC and Panel at their facility and is in the process of troubleshooting continuous voltage in the communications lines, along with Hunter Electric.

All members of the public are invited to attend a public hearing to review the proposed rate study.

This notice is being furnished to you by La Puente Valley County Water District (LPVCWD or District) pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIID (also known as "Proposition 218"). Under the terms of Proposition 218, LPVCWD is required to notify the property owners of record of proposed changes to property-related fees, such as water service.



#### Why have you received this notice?

You have received this information because LPVCWD is evaluating rate adjustments that would affect your water bill. The proposed changes are based on a cost-of-service study conducted by an independent finance consultant. The research, reasoning and analysis behind the proposed adjustments are explained in this document and will be addressed at the upcoming public hearing.

If approved, the proposed rate adjustments will be implemented on:

October 15, 2023 (year one); October 15, 2024 (year two); October 15, 2025 (year three); October 15, 2026 (year four); and October 15, 2027 (year five).

Under California state law, all property owners and customers of record may submit a written protest to the proposed rate changes. Only one protest per parcel is permitted.

Please refer to the "How Can You Participate?" section on page 7 for instructions on submitting a formal written protest against the proposed action. All written protests will be verified. You may also appear at the public hearing to share any comments or concerns.

#### Why are rate changes necessary?

The District has considered numerous factors when reviewing a potential rate change, including the cost of operations and maintenance and securing reliable water supplies. LPVCWD hired an independent consultant to perform a cost-of-service study and determine the revenue required to maintain current service levels. The study demonstrates what it costs the District to provide water service and the appropriate rates to fairly and appropriately allocate the costs of providing water to our customers.

The proposed new rates will allow LPVCWD to address the following needs:



#### Regional Residential Bi-Monthly Water Bill Comparison


The District's current rates are well below similar water utilities in the region.



# Keeping Water Affordable

The District regularly looks for opportunities to secure alternative funding sources such as grants to support its water system improvement program. These efforts enhance LPVCWD's public health and safety programs, educational projects, water awareness and conservation workshops, and community engagement.

La Puente Valley County Water District has successfully secured \$1.275 million in alternate funding from federal grant sources.



Projects that will be completed in this rate cycle would include recycled water efforts, nitrate treatment system, pumping improvements, well rehabilitation, waterline replacements, vehicle repair/replacement, and equipment needs.

#### What are rates used for?

Maintaining pumps, pipes and equipment is an important part of ensuring that the District's customers receive high-quality water and exceptional service. In times of drought, groundwater levels have reached historic lows and require additional resources to manage water supplies. Water system operations managed by the District include:

The District continuously invests in capital improvement projects that improve the performance of the water system or extend the life of existing facilities and equipment to avoid more expensive emergency repairs.

#### **Understanding Your Water Rate Structure**

Residential water rates are made up of two components, fixed and variable charges.

## 1 Fixed Charges

These charges cover the cost of maintaining the reliability of the water system, including maintenance, repair and replacement of infrastructure, water quality testing, meter reading, debt payments, and employee salaries.

# 2 Variable Charges

These charges are based on how much water is delivered to a home and includes the cost to produce groundwater and purchase imported water, electricity, and treatment chemicals.

The District has a five-zone, two tiered variable rate structure for the amount of water used by residential accounts, and zonal rate structure for multi-family, commercial and industrial accounts, fireline and construction services.

Included in Your Rates

The District works hard each day to provide a reliable, safe water supply while also striving to keep rates manageable. Costs to operate the water system and meet regulatory requirements are on the rise. Power, treatment chemical, insurance, wages and groundwater assessments have increased rapidly these past years. Absent rate increases, LPVCWD would experience budget shortfalls.

La Puente Valley County Water District is considering a five-year schedule of changes to water rates and charges that could affect your monthly bill. The District is proposing changes to water commodity charges, fixed service charges, and drought rates.

As a public agency, LPVCWD cannot earn a profit from the services it provides, and must charge no more than the actual costs associated with providing services to its customers.

#### **Cost of Water**

The District is fortunate to have rights to a local groundwater source in the Main San Gabriel Basin. Anything we pump over our allotment must be replaced to maintain healthy water levels in the basin – either by leasing rights or purchasing imported water. Groundwater levels have been impacted significantly by many years of drought.

#### **Understanding Drought Rates**

In times of drought, State water regulators and local water availability require LPVCWD to implement mandatory conservation measures to protect and extend the water supply. To ensure these requirements are met and continue meeting the water needs of our customers in a reliable and affordable manner, the District is proposing drought rates.

These rates may be implemented by the Board of Directors during declared drought levels, state-mandated reductions in the level of potable water usage, or other natural disasters or events that result in a water shortage and the need to require reductions in water usage.







Drought rates account for various stages of water conservation to allow the District to continue meeting its financial obligations during times of significant conservation.

These drought rates were developed to align with the State Water Resources Control Board Water Shortage Contingency Plan Shortage Level, which requires the Board to act to implement the drought/conservation rates.

#### **Managing Groundwater**

Groundwater pumping assessments are imposed to secure additional water resources to maintain water levels in the Basin. Although necessary, this assessment has a large cost impact on all water providers that pump groundwater in the San Gabriel Valley.

#### **Residential Water Rate Structure**

The District incurs additional expense as water usage goes up because the District must use leased water rights to meet that increased demand. Tier 1 rates are based on the District's allocated source of water supply and Tier 2 rates are based on purchased/leased water that the District is required to purchase to meet consumption demands.

Proposed rates would take effect on October 15, 2023.

#### **Drought Rate Structure**

The District has five levels of conservation goals based on water shortage levels. Each conservation goal will require customers to reduce their water use by the percentage at that level.

During a water shortage, the District may be required to implement drought response actions that would include possible water rate increases due to changes in costs in providing customers with water during a shortage. These proposed charges are shown in the table below.

Drought response actions may include development of drought plans, wateruse efficiency programs, education programs, regional partnerships in case of emergency, and water shortage contingency plans.

Protests must specify the rate or charge being protested and must include your name, parcel number and/or service address, and signature. Protests submitted by email or other electronic means do not count as formal written protests. All written protests must be received prior to the conclusion of the public hearing and only one written protest per parcel will be considered. There is a 120-day statute of limitations for challenging any new, increased, or extended fee or charge.

La Puente Valley County Water District welcomes your participation and input throughout the process as its Board of Directors considers the changes explained in this notice.



**Attend the public meeting.** Members of the public are welcome to attend the public hearing regarding the proposed rate changes. The hearing will take place on October 9, 2023, at 4:30 p.m. at 112 N 1st. Street, La Puente, California 91744. At the hearing, all members of the public will have an opportunity to speak, but verbal comments alone do not qualify as a formal protest.

**Public Hearing Process.** At the time of the public hearing, the Board of Directors will hear and consider all written protests and public comments. After the public hearing, if a majority of the property owners or customers of record of the impacted parcels submit written protests in opposition to the proposed rate adjustments, the adjustments will not be adopted. If a majority written protest is not received, LPVCWD's Board of Directors may adopt the proposed changes, though they are not obligated to. If adopted, the proposed rates will become effective October 15, 2023, and scheduled adjustments will be implemented over the next five years, as explained in this document.



# REPORT OF THE WATERMASTER ENGINEER ON HYDROLOGIC CONDITIONS

### **♣** Baldwin Park Key Well (see attached graph)

- ➤ Located in the central portion of the San Gabriel Valley within the City of Baldwin Park and used as a general indication of water elevations throughout the San Gabriel Valley
- ➤ One vertical foot is equivalent to about 8,000 acre-feet of groundwater in the Main Basin
- On July 28, 2023, the Baldwin Park Key Well groundwater elevation was 229.2 feet
- ➤ On August 25, 2023, the Baldwin Park Key Well groundwater elevation was 227.7 feet, a decrease of 0.2 feet from the prior week. The historic low was 169.4 feet on November 21, 2018.
  - ❖ A decrease of about 1.5 feet from the prior month.
  - ❖ About 48 feet higher than one year ago (represents 384,000 acre-feet). Includes an estimated 98,000 acre-feet of untreated imported water in cyclic storage accounts, which represents about 12 feet of groundwater elevation at the Key Well.
    - Producer Cyclic Storage 55,000 AF
    - MWD Cyclic Storage (for UD RDA delivery) 25,000 AF
    - Other Cyclic Storage 18,000 AF

### **♣** Rainfall (see attached graphs)

- ➤ Data are readily available on a daily basis and are indicative of comparative amount of rainfall in the San Gabriel Valley (percent of average)
- > Puddingstone Dam as of August 31, 2023
  - ❖ Average rainfall from July 1<sup>st</sup> through August 31<sup>st</sup> of each year is 0.10 inches
  - ❖ Rainfall during July 1, 2023 through August 31, 2023 is 2.85 inches.
  - ❖ Rainfall during July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 was 28.06 inches, which was 155 percent of average.
- Los Angeles Civic Center as of August 31, 2023
  - ❖ Average rainfall from July 1<sup>st</sup> through August 31<sup>st</sup> of each year is 0.06 inches
  - Agust 31, 2023 is 2.99 inches.
  - ❖ Rainfall during July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 was 28.40 inches, which was 188 percent of average.

## <u>Report of the Watermaster Engineer on Hydrologic Conditions – September 6, 2023</u> (continued)

### **♣** Reservoir Storage and Releases

- There are three dams and reservoirs located along the San Gabriel River above San Gabriel Canyon. Their primary function is for flood control and also used to store watershed runoff for subsequent groundwater replenishment.
  - Cogswell Reservoir is located highest in the watershed and has a maximum storage capacity of 10,475 acre-feet.
  - ❖ San Gabriel Reservoir is located downstream of and receives releases from Cogswell Reservoir, and has a maximum storage capacity of 44,044 acrefeet
  - ❖ Morris Reservoir is located downstream of and receives releases from San Gabriel Reservoir, and has a maximum storage capacity of 28,736 acrefeet. Releases from Morris Reservoir and San Gabriel Reservoir are used at local surface water treatment plants and used for groundwater replenishment.
  - ❖ Total storage capacity is 83,255 acre-feet.
  - ❖ The combined minimum pool behind Cogswell, San Gabriel and Morris Reservoirs is about 10.500 acre-feet.
  - ❖ Combined storage as of August 29, 2023 was 19,336 acre-feet (about 23 percent of capacity).
  - San Gabriel Reservoir inflow was 177 cfs and release was 182 cfs as of August 29, 2023.
  - Morris Reservoir inflow was 177 cfs and release was 460 cfs as of August 29, 2023.

### **↓** Untreated Imported Water Deliveries

### Upper District

- ❖ USG-3 is located in San Gabriel Canyon just below Morris Dam, it represents Upper District's primary point of delivery of untreated imported water for groundwater replenishment to the San Gabriel Valley. The typical delivery rate is about 190 cfs (or about 375 acre-feet per day).
- During July 2023, Upper District delivered 12,296 acre-feet through USG-3.
- During August 2023, Upper District delivered approximately 6,900 acrefeet through USG-3, as of August 29, 2023.

#### ➤ Three Valleys District

- During July 2023, Three Valleys District did not make deliveries through PM-26.
- During August 2023, Three Valleys District does not plan to make deliveries through PM-26.
- ❖ During July 2023, Three Valleys District did not make deliveries through USG-3 and to the San Gabriel Canyon.
- ❖ During August 2023, Three Valleys District does not plan to make deliveries through USG-3 and to the San Gabriel Canyon

# <u>Report of the Watermaster Engineer on Hydrologic Conditions – September 6, 2023</u> <u>(continued)</u>

#### > San Gabriel District

- During July 2023, San Gabriel District delivered 730 acre-feet to the San Dimas Wash, 175 acre-feet to Big Dalton Wash, and 1,000 acre-feet to the San Gabriel Canyon.
- During July 2023, San Gabriel District did not make deliveries to the San Gabriel River.
- ❖ During August 2023, San Gabriel District plans to deliver about 800 acrefeet to the San Dimas Wash, about 130 acre-feet to Big Dalton Wash, and about 1,150 acre-feet to the San Gabriel Canyon.
- ❖ During August 2023, San Gabriel District does not plan to make deliveries to the San Gabriel River.

### Landfill Report

- Watermaster staff toured the following landfills during the month of August 2023:
  - ❖ Azusa Land Reclamation
  - Peck Road
- ➤ During the tour, Watermaster staff found that each landfill appeared to operate consistent with the conditions under each landfill's permit.


### **Water Quality**


- ➤ Water systems are required by the Division of Drinking Water (DDW) to collect water quality data from source wells and provide the results to DDW pursuant to Title 22 (Water quality data collected through Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster's Basinwide Groundwater Quality Monitoring Program)
  - ❖ During August 2023, 74 wells were sampled under Title 22
  - ❖ During July 2023, 53 wells were sampled under Title 22
  - ❖ During July 2023, Stetson Engineers Inc. received no public notice of wells shut down due to contamination.
- ➤ DDW announced it will be proposing the regulations for hexavalent chromium Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) of 10 part per billion (ppb) with a notice of a public hearing to receive public comments regarding the proposed regulations of the hexavalent chromium MCL.
  - ❖ DDW is proposing a compliance schedule based on system size:
    - Systems with more than 10,000 service connections would be required to comply with the MCL within 2 years of rule adoption.
    - Systems with 1,000 to 10,000 service connections would be required to comply with the MCL within 3 years of rule adoption.
    - Systems with less than 1,000 service connections would be required to comply with the MCL within 4 years of rule adoption.
- ➤ DDW announced, it has proposed revised notification level (NL) of 20 ppb and response levels of 200 ppb for manganese based on toxicological endpoints. The current NL for manganese is 500 ppb and the secondary MCL for manganese is 50 ppb.


## <u>Report of the Watermaster Engineer on Hydrologic Conditions – September 6, 2023</u> (continued)

- ❖ Manganese is a secondary standard and is sampled by the Producer as part of the triennial General Mineral / General Physicals (GM/GP) sampling. Watermaster does not sample for manganese.
- ➤ DDW has issued the notification level (NL) for perfluorohexane sulfonic acid (PFHxS) at 3 parts per trillion (ppt) and the response level at 20 ppt under the recommendation by The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA).
  - ❖ Detections of PFHxS above 2 ppt have been found in the Main San Gabriel Basin.
- ➤ United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has updated Health Advisories on Per- and Polyfluroalkyl Substances (PFAS).
  - Interim Health Advisories
    - o Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA)
    - o Perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS)
  - Final Health Advisories
    - o GenX chemicals (PFOA replacement)
    - o Perfluorobutane sulfonic acid (PFBS) (PFOS replacement)
  - ❖ For PFOA and PFOS, some negative health effects may occur at concentrations that are near zero and below our ability to detect at this time.
  - ❖ The lower the level of these chemicals in drinking water, the lower the risk to public health.
    - o PFOA Health Advisory Value 0.004 ppt (Interim), Minimum Reporting Level 4 ppt
    - o PFOS Health Advisory Value 0.02 ppt (Interim), Minimum Reporting Level 4 ppt
    - GenX Chemicals Health Advisory Value 10 ppt (Final),
       Minimum Reporting Level 5 ppt
    - PFBS Health Advisory Value 2,000 ppt (Final), Minimum Reporting Level 3 ppt
